Homeless Outreach Providing Encouragement

H.O.P.E. ensures a sense of dignity and support to the homeless community while offering programs and referrals that encourage movement toward self-sufficiency.





WHO WE ARE

HOPE's core programs provide life-sustaining support and encouragement to the homeless community in Longmont 365 days a year. Our staff offers case management to assist movement toward self-sufficiency, and referrals to appropriate social service agencies for follow-up or more comprehensive care. HOPE programs are the safety net that catches the most vulnerable residents.

HISTORY

A dedicated group of citizens saw the need for a Longmont-based, year-round street outreach to homeless individuals during the frigid winter of 2006-2007 when five people died of exposure-related illnesses in Boulder County. Run primarily by volunteers, the organization was formed on May 15, 2007 and received its 501(c)(3) designation on June 12, 2007.

PROGRAMS & SERVICES

Street Outreach: HOPE is the only agency in Longmont that operates 365 nights each year, and one of the very few to work with clients directly in the community. Staff and volunteers meet clients where they are (in the park, library, etc.) and engage people experiencing homelessness at a deeper level. This highly personal service delivery establishes supportive relationships and increases the chances that individuals will access the array of programs to help them move off the streets and into housing.

Emergency Assistance: Through its emergency assistance program, HOPE provides short-term sheltering, fills prescriptions, and offers bus passes and laundry vouchers. Individuals released from hospitals with no indoor place to stay may be eligible to receive medical respite services.

Emergency Warming Shelter: Launched in 2016, this new service provides a warm and safe place to sleep every night during the coldest months, regardless of the temperature. Additional services include case management, showers, laundry and 'first step' employment to provide the skills, experience and confidence needed to find living-wage jobs.

Step Up Longmont: The Step Up program pairs teams of community volunteers with individuals experiencing homelessness. Teams from faith, community and human services organizations, city government and businesses work with individuals to help achieve self-sufficiency and build support systems.



2017 Impact

With the support of more than 300 dedicated volunteers and generous donations from the giving community, HOPE was able to provide the following during 2017:

1,565 individuals served

28,281 meals

3,109 pairs of socks

1,644 blankets

5,581 guest nights of cold-weather sheltering

3,109 nights of transitional housing
